# When 'Max Points' Wasn't

If you're a sheep addict, you know the value of having 'max points' for the sheep draws. 'Max points' are of particular value in a state such as Wyoming, where 75% of the tags go to applicants with the most points.

So imagine my surprise when I looked at the 2015 Wyoming draw odds earlier this year and saw a unit it appeared I had an excellent chance of drawing, even though there were only three non-resident tags and 319 non-residents had more points than I did.

Obviously, my first questions were, "Why is this unit not being pursued by those 319 sheep hunters?" "Why is the success rate in the low 60% range?" "Are there very few sheep?" "Are the rams small?" "Is it very physically demanding? "Is it all of the above?"

Intrigued, I did some research, starting with the WY DGF sheep biologist for the unit. He told me there were plenty of sheep, the genetics were among the best in the state, but that it was very physically demanding and the sheep were mostly at elevations between 11,000' and 12,500.'

BINGO! That last one told me everything I needed to know; people weren't apply for the unit because it might well be the most physically demanding and intimidating unit anywhere. Of those who do apply and draw, many can't handle the physical and mental challenge, so end up with tag soup instead of a ram.

That was right up my alley, even at age 67. So I applied, drew a Wyoming tag five to ten years sooner than I would otherwise would have, then took a great ram!

The unit is intimidating beyond description and tested my fitness and mental discipline to the limit. On the other hand, I had a great adventure and put my tag on a terrific ram!

You can too, but **only** if you are physically and mentally prepared!

Note: In the 2016 draw, of the 319 non-residents who had more points than I did, not one of them applied for my unit. Of the 402 guys who had the same number of points I did, only five applied in my unit. Thanks, guys!

## **The Twenty Four Hour Buck**

After seeing and hearing stories about the big mule deer bucks in the Sand Hills of Nebraska, I knew 2014 was going to be my year for a chance at a trophy muley! This was an archery hunt, and opening weekend was moved up to September 1st, so a buck in velvet would be an added bonus.

The first day of the hunt was spent glassing the many slopes and draws that come with the Sand Hills. If you have never been to this area, make a trip. It is a very unique and gorgeous place. After getting the lay of the land and seeing a monster one hundred and ninety pound plus buck on the way back to the lodge, I was getting excited to make a stalk in the coming days! I was sharing the lodge with fellow artist Larry Zach of Des Moines. Larry and his guide had also seen a couple monsters on the first day. Game plans were made for day two during a dinner made by my guide and expert cook Dustin.

The start of the second day was foggy and warm with a ton of mosquitos; I thought I had left our state bird back in Minnesota. The pests were forgotten when Dustin said we had a shooter! We moved into position and make the stalk

up a yet-unnamed hill with the wind in our favor. Even though we were discovered by a coyote and busted by a doe at ten yards, we managed to get into a position approximately sixty-five yards away. It was then that the doe blew, sending the buck on over the ridge.


Regrouping, we moved up to the next ridgeline and found that the buck had bedded down. We were at fifty yards. After spending the last two months shooting every other day, I felt confident in the distance.

It was 9:30 AM when I drew and stood up over the yuccas. The deer got to its feet, giving me a great broadside shot, which I took. The shot looked good but may have been a bit low. Still, we were confident. Dustin moved quickly to get around the eastern edge of the ridge. Seeing the buck walking slowly in the valley, blood on his left side, we set up to watch him. He moved up in a draw and bedded down once more, at times gasping for air. He made an attempt to stand but was forced back to the ground. After watching him struggle for next three hours with no respite, we figured it would be best to try to get another shot in him.

This time we ended up above him at forty yards, with a laying down shot from the front being the only shot available. I chose to wait until the buck's head was turned; exposing a bigger kill shot. It was not to be; the swirling winds gave us away. To our dismay, the buck got right on its feet with renewed energy and bounded away, stopping at a couple hundred yards to look back briefly before heading off over the next ridge. Still struggling to figure out how mortal the wound was and how he managed to run off, we made another plan. Dustin felt he knew where he would bed down again so we started another stalk. Again the wind did not help us; we were busted. Again we watched the deer bound away, this time going more than six hundred yards over a distant ridgeline.

All the ups and downs of big game hunting were in full play now. I tried to remain optimistic, but at this point it was not looking good! We decided to go back to the lodge to eat quickly and go back to the hills for the afternoon. When we returned we made multiple stalks in areas where Dustin thought he might be, but there was nothing. Heading back to the truck and frustrated, I noticed something out of place.

There was the buck! It looked as though he was piled up along a fence line. Hopes that it was now a recovery were squashed when Dustin said he was, "very much alive." I knew stalk number three was going to be the most difficult as the final shooting distance ended up at 10 yards! I did shoot but it was definitely more like wing shooting as the buck was in flight when the arrow left. A miss of course.



### The Twenty Four Hour Buck continued

We tried our best to get into position for another stalk as time was not on our side. The worst part of the hunt was watching him walking away on property we could not hunt. Now I was really bummed out, I figured he was lost!

It was now my guide Dustin's turn to be the optimist. He said, "we will get on him in the morning, there is nothing on that property for him to bed in". Starting early, we started with locating the blood trail. African trackers had nothing on Dustin this day! We stalked a half dozen sand bowls before locating the buck again. This morning's shot was going to be twenty yards, laying down. While it was not the best shot, I did take out his shoulder, which confused him and slowed him down enough for the killing 30 yard shot. It was 9:30 am again, giving this deer the name: "twenty four hour buck." Dustin from Deer Meadows Outfitters helped me take a great trophy, which was also my first archery deer kill! Great scenery, great guide, and great deer; I could not have asked for more.



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
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
